4	We now come to our part of the meeting where we have our
5	hearing of visitors. Do we have anybody else on with us,

7	MR. PERFETTI: Nobody else.
8	MALE SPEAKER: Rick, if I could, and maybe
9	you've already heard this, but the Department of State has
10	come out with an interpretation that is going to extend,
11	you know, the use of these virtuals soon meetings until
12	June 26, so that took the pressure off what we were
13	talking about before. You know, what are we going to do
14	come June 7? What are we going to do next week? So that,
15	like I said, took the pressure off and we can continue
16	with this process at least until the end of the month.
17	SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Yeah, and then we'll still
18	have clarification once that ends to how many people can
19	show up at a meeting.
20	MR. PERFETTI: Yeah, hopefully it will be better
21	than their roughly 10 person rule right now, so
22	SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Right.
23	MR. PERFETTI: but we'll see. There's only
24	two meetings this summer; right?
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SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Yeah. Well, we have three

All right, anybody else?

COUNCILPERSON BERTONI: Rick, as I'd say it's a motion rather than a resolution. I think it only involves transfers.

SUPERVISOR MATERESE: You're right. Sorry.

It's a motion, thank you. So, having heard that motion and that correction there, anybody else have any comments? Hearing none, we'll call for a vote. All those in favor say Aye.

Hearing none, the 13 roll call, please, Mr. Perfetti. 14 MR. PERFETTI: Staley? 15 COUNCILPERSON STALEY: Aye. 16 MR. PERFETTI: Bauman? 17 COUNCILPERSON BAUMAN: 18 MR. PERFETTI: Bertoni? 19 COUNCILPERSON BERTONI: Aye. 20 MR. PERFETTI: Augostini? 21 COUNCILPERSON AUGOSTINI: 22 MR. PERFETTI: Materese? 23 SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Aye.

1 MALE SPEAKER: He doesn't have to. You've 2 usually been -- letting him go last, but go ahead. 3 COUNCILPERSON AUGOSTINI: I just want to recognize John Nezlick's terrific life, north sider 4 5 resident life long, Northside John City Resident. Maybe some people know his son, Jack, Jr., who's the Safety 6 7 Manager for Broome County, so condolences to all the Nezlicks a very tight knit group, a very well-known family 8 9 in Johnson City. I've been talking to his son, his wife, 10 his sister. Mr. Nezlick is in a better place right now. 11 SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Tom, is that a relation to 12 Andy Nezlick? 13 MR. AUGOSTINI: So, that's a good question, 14 because there are so many Nezlicks in Johnson City. I 15 don't know who's related to who. 16 SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Andy was an Endicott 17 family. He was a baseball pitcher. 18 MR. AUTOSTINI: Right, for the Braves. 19 SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Andy's grandfather played 20 for the Triplets and lived in Johnson City. 21 MR. AUTOSTINI: Okay. 22 SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Curley Nezlick, but I don't -- I don't think -- I don't think that they were 23 24 related, so this John Nezlick who passed away, his wife, 25 Joan, is Rich Kublick's sister.

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1	MR. AUGOSTINI: Okay.
2	SUPERVISOR MATERESE: (Inaudible)
3	MALE SPEAKER: John Nezlick, the builder.
4	COUNCILPERSON AUGOSTINI: I'm not sure.
5	SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Anyone else?
6	COUNCILPERSON BERTONI: Yes, it is my
7	understanding that the Village of Endicott has promised to
8	rescind the permit to allow the battery recycling place
9	to locate in Endicott.
10	SUPERVISOR MATERESE: As far as I understand,
11	they rescinded the (inaudible) that they had to their code
12	but it just opens up the thing for another review. So, it
13	hasn't officially ended the debate. Go ahead.
14	COUNCILPERSON BERTONI: The information I had
15	was at the next meeting, they were going to rescind it,
16	but I'm not sure (inaudible)
17	SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Okay. I don't believe
18	they finished the debate. I think they continued the
19	debate after they rescind that last code thing.
20	COUNCILPERSON BERTONI: Yeah, and they're going
21	to form some of the recommendations are that they form
22	an oversight committee and that they do a joint task force
23	of some sort to debate the issues in front of the Board, I
24	guess.
25	SUPERVISOR MATERESE: (Inaudible)

1 COUNCILPERSON BERTONI: So, it was my 2 understanding that the Mayor and two of the other people that voted to pass it have now promised that at the next 3 meeting to rescind that change in the code. 4 5 SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Correct. COUNCILPERSON BERTONI: 6 That's what I 7 understood. SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Correct. Anyone else? 8 9 MALE SPEAKER: Yeah, if anyone is willing to 10 explain that process to me, it's like the who's on first 11 routine, because I am completely lost at what they're 12 doing on that subject. 13 SUPERVISOR MATERESE: So, it's easy to get lost, 14 huh? 15 Well, as far as I understand, they passed this 16 -- this new code, but then some new information came to 17 light that some chemical was not accounted for by D.E.C. 18 The D.E.C. then wrote back to the company and said, you 19 need to pass some further tests before we're going to 20 allow this (inaudible) process, and so the Village then 21 rescinded, or is going to rescind, I'm not sure exactly 22 where that is. This new code and then as Frank said 23 they're going to create this group and debate the issues 24 at another point in time.

MALE SPEAKER: My confusion comes in when -- and

did, they did.

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this is just based on media reports is when the Village of Endicott says there's nothing we need to do because everything was based upon the D.E.C. permit that was approved. So, was the D.E.C. permit, did we send it?

SUPERVISOR MATERESE: I believe we did -- they

MALE SPEAKER: So, there's no approval for them to operate, so if the D.E.C. refused it and says, oh, we have our answers now, here's your permit back, can they operate, because statements have been made that the Village doesn't even do anything as long as the D.E.C. approves the air permit, the company can operate out of either -- 1 Clark Street.

last meeting. The letters that she read to us said that the D.E.C. has given them a couple of options. One is to get companies to certify that none of the (inaudible) reached (inaudible) providing -- have this chemical in them or this company has to do something to haul those batteries out of the waste (inaudible) -- So, in order for them to do that, it's going to take probably months or years, I would think, to try to work all that through and get those batteries -- they're going to have to take those batteries at a time. I don't know how they would have a process that promises that none of those batteries are in

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there. You know, so they have to have some process in place, and then these, I'm not sure what they're called, they're not (inaudible) but they're some -- some chemical that gets released -- there are provisions by the State now, you're not allowed to -- exist by the State that are -- that now have contaminated wells, I think, from burning 6 7 these chemicals. One of them was in a burning vat that firefighters use (inaudible) -- so as far as I know this whole process has been (inaudible) for an extended period 10 of time until they can get all of these companies to certify that the batteries they are assessing are not --12 don't have these chemicals in them, which could take a long, long time.

> SUPERVISOR AUGOSTINI: But -- but if the village is positioned is they didn't need to take any action in order for that company to begin operation, what are they rescinding?

> SUPERVISOR MATERESE: I don't know. I mean if you are looking -- if you go on the assumption that people are telling the truth, that's (inaudible) -- but then if people are not telling the truth, that's different, right? So, if they were saying that the change in the code didn't give them permission, when it actually did, you know, I mean that would be the problem.

> > MR. AUGOSTINI: Okay. That's a good question,

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you would just hope that the truth doesn't need a footnote somewhere. That it's the truth.

SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Anyone else? Oh, I'm sorry, Tom.

MR. AUGOSTINI: No, no. I'm just very confused,
Tom about everything that is occurring.

SUPERVISOR MATERESE: You should call the Mayor.

MR. AUGOSTINI: I would. I just have something in my mind that says I would be even further confused.

SUPERVISOR MATERESE: Okay. Anyone else have anything else to comment on. (Inaudible) -- You know what, let me just say this. I forgot this. It was before in our work session. I let you guys know that I called Peter Potter (ph), I called Pat Geary (ph) and I called Jeff Vanauken (ph) and asked them to put on extra patrols going around our parks, particularly our carousels to be safe during this time of confusion going on right now. They were willing -- they were very willing to assist us and make sure that they could do this by protecting (inaudible) so I want to thank them for doing that. asked them to continue through the week here. Hopefully, that will happen, and I just hope and pray that the country will calm down and we can get back to just worrying about the Coronavirus, and not have to worry about our people -- protestors being shot at or police
