TOWN OF UNION BOARD MEETING

August 5, 2020

The Regular Meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Union was held on Wednesday, August 5, 2020 at 7:00 P.M. in the Town Board Room, 3111 East Main Street, Endwell, New York.

PUBLIC HEARINGS:

A Public Hearing was called for on July 22, 2020 to solicit public input on the Substantial Amendment to the CDBG FFY 2019 Annual Action Plan for the proposed use of CDBG-CV funds made available through the CARES Act for Wednesday August 5, 2020 at 7:00 PM.
