TOWN OF UNION BOARD MEETING

<u>September 20, 2023</u>

The Regular Meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Union was held on Wednesday, September 20, 2023 at 7:00 P.M. in the Town Board Room, 3111 East Main Street, Endwell, New York.

<u>BOARD MEMBERS PRESENT</u>: Councilman Frank J. Bertoni, Councilman Joseph P. Nirchi, Sr., Councilman David Kudgus.

Absent: Supervisor Robert Mack, Councilman Thomas Augostini.

TOWN OFFICIALS PRESENT: Town Clerk Leonard J. Perfetti

Absent: Town Attorney Alan Pope, Deputy Town Attorney Rosemarie Pope and Deputy Town Clerk Rebecca Kruczkowski.

Councilman Frank Bertoni opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Moved by Nirchi, seconded by Kudgus to approve the Minutes of the Regular Town of Union Board Meeting held on Wednesday, September 6, 2023. Carried.

HEARING OF VISITORS:

Denise Monforte, 306 Antoinette Drive, Endicott, said kudos to everyone that was involved with building the walking paths at Glendale Park. She said she is a member of the New York Citizens Audit Group that is concerned about voter integrity throughout New York State. She presented a proposed resolution to the Board to sign in support of an end-to-end audit of the New York State 2022 General Election.



Sally Dorak, 25 Adams Street, Binghamton, and also a member of the New York Citizens Audit Group, said that New York State has a unique registration system that issues one State verification number and one County verification number per person. She explained that findings by researchers from their group found that 42% of the voting population has more than one number assigned to their name that can be used for extra votes because they are in the system. She said their Executive Director Marly Hornik FOILed New York State Election Boards and found there were 2.4 million votes in 2021 for 1.1 million unique registered voters and that they found people with 25 unique numbers assigned to them. She also said that the Secretary of State was made aware of these findings prior to the 2022 elections, and they certified the elections anyway.

Linda Burghardt, Lisle, New York, also a member the New York Citizens Audit Group, said their head researcher Andrew Pakett submitted his documentation, methodology and findings for his research to the Journal of Information Warfare that was reviewed in the blind by an independent cybersecurity specialist and was published within 6 months. She said they are at the meeting because they want the people who are running our election system to do their job and be accountable for the things they have done illegally. They certified the election with 338,000 more votes than voters and that is breaking the law. They are letting illegible and counterfeit people vote – people who have no birthdays or addresses, people who have died, and their database is riddled with inaccuracy. We need to make them accountable.

Holly Greski, Vestal, New York, also a member of the group, said this is personal to her since she, her kids and ex-husband were cloned. She said they were registered in Westchester County and now are in Broome County, except her ex-husband who is still in Westchester but is also in the Broome County database. She said she does not know how this can happen. She said each County Election Board can look only at their own dat base, so they have no idea that someone is registered somewhere else. Ms. Greski said their group was invited to speak at the next Association of Towns meeting to be held on September 28, 2023, and invited everyone to attend. She said they have 2000 volunteers going town to town, county to county with this information and they are asking the Town to defend the people of their Town to have accurate elections by signing this resolution. She also said their group is getting ready to litigate and has questions to ask; was the election legal, and was there any misconduct.

Councilman Joseph P. Nirchi, Sr. asked if they are getting media coverage with this information.

Ms. Greski said not currently.

Councilman Frank J. Bertoni asked if their information was being shown on Social Media.

Ms. Greski said people can look up New York Citizens Audit Group for their website and they are on Facebook, Twitter and she is not sure about other ones.



Linda Burghardt, Lisle, New York, said they are going nationally with the information and there are 23 states currently being trained to review their database of their own voters.

Town Clerk Leonard J. Perfetti told Ms. Burghardt that his office notifies the County Election Board every month with a list of decedents that provides the names and addresses of the deceased. He said he does not know what happens to the list after the County receives it.

Carol Laskoski, 37 Edwards Street, Johnson City, asked the group when it was noticed all this is happening and if by chance, it was when the voting machines were computerized. She said maybe Trump really did win the election.

Gary Huyck, former Town of Union employee, said he owns 98.6 acres at the dead end of Shale Drive. He said the Town started a stone and oil application on the road that was called to a stop by someone claiming they owned the property. He submitted a paper to the Board's Secretary highlighting the fact that he does own what is called Shale Drive, which is actually the road to the Huyck farm from Boswell Hill Road originating back to the early 1900's. He would like to know what steps are being taken to finish the stone and oil project. He said Frank Maddi claims to be the owner of a piece of Shale Drive; which Mr. Huyck said he does not now, nor has he ever, owned any portion of Shale Drive. Mr. Huyck reminded the Board that Town Attorney Richard Place came out years ago to the property because John Kunzman questioned why the Town was taking care of a private road. He said it is a private road that the Town has to maintain to be passable at all times. He said he is at a loss that he was not notified about anything being done, since he is the owner. He asked to be contacted by someone on the Board to find out what is happening.

Councilman Frank J, Bertoni said he would look into it and get back to him.

As no one else wished to speak, Councilman Frank Bertoni closed the first Hearing of Visitors.
